The Call

n 2000, when I was 17 years old, I felt God calling me to explore a vocation to religious life. I didn't know anything about religious life. The only thing I felt in my heart was a very great desire to give myself to the Lord forever, to be only for Him and to live a life of service for Him and His people. During this time, I watched an EWTN series on St. Teresa of the Andes – "La Juanita" as she is known in Spanish-speaking Carmels. She is a wonderful saint! It was through this program on St. Teresa of the Andes that I learned about Carmelite spirituality and Carmelite life. This program led me to discern a Carmelite vocation with the Discalced Carmelite nuns of San Jose Monastery in Bogota,

Colombia. I arrived on March 19, 2001, the Solemnity of St. Joseph, and throughout my time of initial discernment I felt much peace and joy. I made my first profession on July 4, 2004, and my final profession at age 24 on July 1, 2007.

My Path to Battimore n 2014, my community ioined Carmelites around the world in creating a virtual choir for the centenary celebration of St. Teresa of Avila. I was one of five sisters in my community who participated in the project. (Check out YouTube to listen to the Carmelite virtual choir perform "Nada Te Turbe") Through participating in the virtual choir project, I came to learn about more contemporary expressions of Carmelite life. A few years later, during the

pandemic, I was able to get to know the Baltimore Carmel by participating in their Sunday liturgies, Vespers, Lectio Divina, and the Christian Mediation group -- all over Zoom. I felt very drawn to

their contemporary expression of the Carmelite charism. So, after a great deal of prayer and discernment, I came to Baltimore in 2022 to discern transferring to Baltimore Carmel. I'm delighted to share that I have since begun my transfer process. I feel as if I have already lived here for many years. I am very happy here!

he first time I drove to the monastery – to attend Sunday Mass with a friend who worshipped regularly at the monastery – I asked myself, "Now, who would want to be a Carmelite nun?" God has a wonderful sense of humor!

My Discernment

started discerning with the community in 2019. At the time, I was living in the Washington D.C. metro area and working for a government consulting firm. Given my relative proximity to the monastery, I was able to come for monthly visits. However, after the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic, visiting in-person was no longer possible. The community was wonderful about creating opportunities for me to continue my discernment with them virtually. In 2021, I took a one-year leave of

absence from work to live with the community – an extended monastic experience of sorts. Sharing life with the sisters for a year was invaluable to my both vocational discernment and overall life, as I know it has been for other women who have come to spend time with the community, even those who discerned a different path. Throughout my time living with the community, I would find myself saying time and again, "I have never felt more me" – See our website for a *video* that shares more about my experience. And so, in November 2021 I applied to enter Baltimore Carmel: I officially entered in January 2022.

hile the "how" and "why" of my presence here is –

and likely will forever remain – a mystery to me, my sense of what initially drew me to Carmelite life in this Carmel and of what continues to draw me during this time of formation is the accent on prayer and communal living for the sake of the transformation of the world. I believe with the full force of my being that our personal and communal prayer, as well as our living peacefully in community, contributes to the unfolding of our present and our future toward greater wholeness. And, in a time of seemingly unprecedented fragmentation, nothing feels more "me" than to give all of myself to the work of whole-making.

If you are reading this because you feel drawn – if even just a little – to some aspect of our life, I hope you'll consider learning more. As our late Sister Veronica once said, Carmelite life "is a life of infinite possibilities." What possibility might God be calling you to explore?
